2009 Annapolis Boat Show

Five o'clock in the morning on October 9th and we're in the airport getting ready to take off for Annapolis for our annual trek to the US Sailboat Show. We have a long flight, a drive in the rental car and a painful school bus ride from the Navy stadium to the boat show, but my spirits are high with anticipation. I'm eager to see how my perspective has changed at the show this year since I now have 2 sailing seasons under my belt and I've spent a week on a catamaran. Will I still care about the same issues as I traipse over the shiny new boats?

After studiously ignoring the vendor booths with all their goodies, we made our way pretty much straight to the new Fountaine Pajot 41 foot Lipari catamaran. What a beauty! Everything we want and need and then some. All of the issues that I have had with F.P. cats have been addressed on this cat. The galley is now square to the boat and well organized. Lots of storage and clear communication access with the cockpit. The hulls are amazingly roomy and the separate shower is wonderful. This is a well thought out boat and one I could live on easily.

After that we make our way over to the new version of the <u>Leopard 38</u>. Leopard is making a transition away from the louvered steps on the slanted front windows and joining the ranks of the vertical windows seen in the Lagoons. For Tim this cat is love at first sight. There is nearly nothing that we would change on it. It's a tough decision for me as I like both the Lipari and the Leopard 38 about equally.

We spend the rest of the day Saturday and Sunday climbing around a lot of different monohulls and even some production boats which we have shied away from in the past due to the opinion of some that they are not blue water worthy. We are pleasantly surprised by the <u>Jeanneau 45</u>, the <u>Beneteau 43</u> and the <u>Hunter 45DS</u> and surprisingly disappointed by the <u>Dufour 525</u> which we thought was our dream monohull.

It was a great show this year, and we came home with our resolve to live on a boat strengthened and the timeline shifted up a little sooner than before. After the weekend, it became apparent that we could be equally happy living on just about any of the boats we aw, cat or monohull, production or custom, as long as it had the basics for safety and we could afford it. Yes there is that part of it...money...and this year we came home from the boat show with a lot less of it in our pockets. We picked up a new Sailrite machine so you can all look out for some pretty new duds to appear on Nomad before the 2010 sailing season. We have to treat her well so we can sneak off to the 2010 show without hurting her feelings!

#### Product Review - QuikFix E-Treme Tape by Deb

We keep 2 rolls of this tape in a drawer on our boat for plumbing emergencies. It's not adhesive, but as soon as it touches itself it fuses and makes a bond as hard or harder as the original material. It makes a permanent air or water tight seal and also insulates to 8000 volts. If you have leaky water hose or even a head drain leaking, just stretch the tape around the hose that's leaking and it will cure almost immediately.
