--COMMODORE'S COMMENTS---

In June several people from BYC enjoyed a trip to the British Virgin Islands. In total we had 26 people on four boats. Some of the group consisted of friends and family of BYC members. By going later in the year this time it was a bit hotter but the winds and fair seas didn't disappoint us. Our first stop was Normal Island and the night was spent dancing and drinking at the Willy T. It was here that some of our female crew decided a Tattoo (albeit temporary) would be a great way to start their adventure. Of the 8 days we spent in the BVI's we had only one afternoon/evening of rain. Unfortunately this was our second day at sail and the night of the "Full Moon Party" in Trellis Bay, a party we were looking forward to attending. Since these parties are very popular we arrived mid afternoon only to find the mooring balls were all taken. Our second choice was nearby Marina Cay where we found the same problem. This forced us to practice our anchoring skills outside their mooring field. Gracefully among other boats (also at anchor) we lowered our hook. As it turned out we hooked quickly and much better than expected. As for the "Full Moon Party", well none of us were looking forward to the mile long dinghy ride in the rain so we had our own party on board. The next morning we were off to the North Sound of Virgin Gorda. Well, we wanted to leave but the well-set anchor wouldn't budge. No matter how we turned, tugged, pushed and pulled the dam thing didn't move. Since our anchor and chain were set in 45 feet of water and no dive gear was aboard we elected to call for help. As you might imagine help can be expensive down there but the diver we hired had us free in a matter of minutes. Of all the boats at anchor that night we were the only one firmly attached to an underground cable feeding the nearby island. King Neptune taught us several lessons this trip that we certainly will remember on future voyages. As for the rest of the trip it went much more smoothly. We spent two days at Anegada exploring the island. We even rented a truck to visit several beaches. One stop was in beautiful Cow Wreck Bay. While there we even ran into a celebrity of sorts. Sir Richard Branson the British business magnate noted for the various Virgin companies. As we later found out he was apparently participating in a local regatta of some kind. Our next stop was Jost Van Dyke were we spent several hours visiting Foxy's and meeting its namesake. Foxy is guite a character as he always has a story or joke to tell and loves to take pictures with those that visit. The next morning we set sail for Soper's Hole to meet up with other members of BYC that had just started their trip. After lunch and provisioning we took our last sail of the trip to Peter Island. We found Great Harbor to be a peaceful bay to spend our last night. Motoring back to Road Town our last morning was guite sad. You just hate to leave the islands. There is always next year to look forward to!

If you have visited the lake over the last month or so you've noticed the water levels were quite high. The Corp of Engineers had a meeting May 16th regarding the lake level. Barring unforeseen circumstances they expect it to return to a more typical pool level of 449' by early July. Unforeseen circumstances came in the form of more rain bringing the lake to just under elevation 455.

As I mentioned in last month's article BYC is going to host some kids from the Missouri Children's Burn Camp on August 27th. I estimate needing 12-15 boats to get involved.
