We left a couple days early to get the green crew at least a day or two on a Trimaran (or any sailboat by that matter) surely enough we ran right smack into the middle of those tornados which ravaged Alabama. We were very very close at times hearing radio warnings of a tornado crossing 5 miles ahead while another one was 10 miles back of us. Dodging trees and debris with an F boat in tow isn't much fun. But we arrived in beautiful Pensacola bay in one piece.

Dropped the boat at the public dock (ouch 10 \$) and motored over to the Margaritaville Beach....I wouldn't call it a Beach and there wasn't really a path from the road either, at the back of the boat is the channel. It was possible to anchor there (as a lot of other boats proved the week to come) but not perfect. We got chased away from the Margaritaville employee parking lot (2/3 empty) hmmm? No problem as we proceeded with trailer to the Ft Pickens state park campground. Very nice place indeed. Next day we found our boat on the beach (almost expected) so to plan B. We had arranged a dock space at the close by Apartments ahead of time. (Thanks Todd Miller!) Worked out well!

We went sailing the next day and promptly destroyed the mainsail. (This was ripped last year and fixed by Calvert Sails over the winter). It is now Friday night and the clock is ticking for a Monday early start. Schurr Sails in Pensacola was ready to head out for a race in Mobile bay and couldn't do it. "Doc" owner of Emerald sails in Ft Walton Beach to the rescue. We drove the sail over Saturday morning and he had it nicely fixed the next day. Thanks to Don Wigston to bring the repaired sail up the coast for us on Sunday afternoon. In the meantime we tried a used back up sail from Flight Simulator, which the Tom Reese crew gave us. However the boltrope was to thin for this old Omuhundro mast and we rolled it back up and returned it. No problem as our repaired sail was back.

Fast forward to Monday morning 30 min before the start the repaired mainsail ripped again. Not Emerald sails problem as it ripped totally different spot! Cliff Farrah, Team Strategery to the rescue. He went out of his way and yelled over to pick up his Sprint 750 sail on the beach. Now a 28 R looks kinda funny with a 750 Mainsail, but it worked. We missed the Start for the long Distance race (note: a 4 minute start time limit is kind of a little rough for a long distance race) but we clawed our way up to Juana's Beach, where we expected beer and food. No free beer and the food was somewhat to be desired for ...Good that we have our own beer on board J A generous helping in energy bars got us through the second race.

In the evening we went to Schurr sails that had snacks and a beer..... hoorah. We took the opportunity and ordered a new headsail from Hunter at Schurr Sails. (After all one has to support the

sponsors, right?) If you guys need sails please check them out, they make all sails, not only go fast stuff. And their prices are really really good!

Day two saw W/L buoy races. The "German bikini team" must have irritated quite a few teams, as they sailed right through the closed starting line. Maybe it was the leeward mark that was very close to the gate, however. I know we had to round the CB and seemingly harden up like crazy to make the mark. In the end 8 boats got dsq and we moved up in the ranks (not that I like to do it that way).

Race 2 went pretty smooth and after the finish we heard on the VHF that the 3rd race is not going to happen because of impeding bad weather. We sailed right up the creek home. Half ways around the tip we did recognize that we must have misunderstood the announcement on the VHF, as the other boats were all gathered for the third race. We could have turned around, but we decided that better safe than sorry and headed home. Maybe it was the roar of the Blue Angels in the morning that made our ears gone bonkers for a day or two; it was indeed spectacular to watch these guys flying that close to our boats.

We were tired and missed the Zern Rigging Seminar, but up and ready to eat for the Margaritaville/Landshark Party, which got rerouted into the downstairs Bar at the Hemmingway's instead. And again no free beer? We ordered and paid something from the cash bar and meanwhile got mighty hungry. Food was standard buffet style stuff, nothing fancy. Who were the two folks who cut in line? Especially tacky as there was not enough food for everyone..... We enjoyed the picture show for a while, but rather quickly made our 20 min drive to the Campground for cold beer and some excellent wine around the fire. We had some of the Weta guys over and had a good talk with them starring into the fire pit until it got late.

Good choice. The party at PBYC was at full swing when we arrived and the home cooked food was indeed excellent. I assume some Yacht Club Members worked real hard to get this going. Bravo the food was plenty and absolutely great. Beer was 3 dlr L

Day four the race course was in the middle of a Naval training session (or was it the other way around ?) Quickly the course was relocated a little north and the fun could start. Still with our borrowed 750 mainsail we clawed upwind and we actually didn't do not all that bad. The receding wind made it more and more difficult. The two big fat barges roaring down didn't help either. But we did had a good time and eventually finished while the sea breeze slowly filled in. No second race, but the girls had a great time sailing the ole barge back to the slip, where we quickly demounted the borrowed main and got ready for trophy presentation at PBYC.

A huge Thanks to all the fine competitors who kept us going through the week. Tom Reese with Flight Simulator, John Achim on Tri n CatchMe, Cliff Farrah with Strategery, Don Wigston, and last but certainly not least Randy Smyth who climbed up our mast to retrieve a halyard. A super big Thanks must go out to Bert Rice who worked his butt off. If he ever will do this again (and I surely hope so) he deserves a little help prior and during the event, as he was all over the place trying to make this the best event for everybody. Again Bert many, many, many thanks.

Now, lets talk about money. I paid 180 bucks for the boat plus 150 dlr for 3 crewmembers extra. With all the sponsors lined up it seemed silly that we had to buy all the beer by ourselves. The grub at Juanas was barely consumable, the later offerings were a little better but nothing more than a 5 dlr "all you can eat" buffet here in the middle of the country, and it wasn't even enough for all at times. (Again the exception was the home cooked meal) The trophies were lets say a little lackluster for a national event. (Don't misunderstand I LOVE my totally undeserved 3rd place ashtray). The event was great and the camaraderie and fellow Corsair and F-boat folks are some thing to behold. I am ready to go down to Florida again just say when.....
