----FROM THE RACE CHAIR ----



Greetings Boulder Sailors;

The season's first race is in the books, and a good time was had by all. Conditions were moderate: 10-12 knots from the South and scattered showers, most of which missed our race area that afternoon. Thank you to Thorsten and Cheryl for performing CB duty: well done you guys.

A short word on the scoring. All races that are on the posted schedule will count towards an overall championship for the season. Low point scoring per the racing

rules of sailing will be used. To encourage participation all boats that do participate will receive a score based on their order of finish in any race in which they sail. Non-participants will receive a score of one pt. plus the number of boats that sailed in and completed a race. For example, if we have 7 boats sailing a non-participant will receive 8 points, just as a participant that does not finish or is disqualified for any reason. In many cases provision is made to exclude a given number of races from a season series so that a racers poorest performances can be disregarded when compiling the seasons results. The percentage of races that can be excluded should probably not be more than 20 or less than 15. In other words the more races that are completed the more scores we can throw out. Hopefully on some days we'll be able to sail two or three races, thereby increasing the number of possible throw outs.

Any racer that volunteers to do Committee Boat Duty will receive a score for that days races equal to his seasonal average compiled at the end of the racing season. Anyone who does race should be eligible for committee boat duty only once. The next race is scheduled for June 6. Hope to see everyone out.

----FLOTSAM & JETSAM ----

I anchored for lunch Sunday before last in Cove 4/Allen's Branch and was disappointed to see that there are dozens (More? What couldn't I see below the surface?.....) of what appears to be discarded Christmas trees, I presume to create fish habitat. It would seem that it's eliminated the southern half of cove 4 from an anchoring area. Nothing was marked, and as mentioned above I wonder what I couldn't see. Seems like a recipe for disaster to try to anchor, snagging a Christmas tree below the surface and while trying to untangle your anchor, blow down on another boat or the lee shore.

I just talked with a Dave Davis at the Corps. He confirmed a program called "Fishing Hot Spots" and said Christmas trees and approved "purpose built fish habitats" are being sunk in many areas of the lake-seemingly in most all of our potential anchoring areas. He referred me to a Joe Smothers who runs the program for more information, and sent me the attached list of GPS coordinates (though he thinks it's a year out of date) of where things are being sunk and confirmed they are not being marked on the surface in any way and should all be below the surface when the lake is at summer pool. *Editor's note: please see the pdf attachment that came in the same email as this article to see where the finishing hotspots AKA sailboat deterrents are located.
