Sailing News from BYC Member:

As a BYC member and racer, I sail Gandydancer, a Corsair F/ 31 folding trimaran. When in town I dry sail out of West Access but I race (and have for years) under the BYC Flag! This has been a pretty good year for Gandydancer and the Club.

We raced the Chicago NOODs and finished 5th (we missed the first day due to mechanical problems but came back for 2 bullets out of 3 races).

Julie Jones and I also did the Doublehanded Challenge from Waukegan, IL to Port Washington, WI (60 miles) and finished 2nd over the line; first in our fleet (we were the only multihull!).

The next day with a full crew (4) we raced the Queen's Cup from Milwaukee, WI to Grand Haven, MI. We were 3rd over the line finishing behind another F/31 and a Santa Cruz 70. We beat the rest of the 70-foot fleet even though they had started 10 minutes before us! We carried a boat speed of over 16 knots for more than 3 hours. It was a dark, wild and wet ride. By the way, this is a night race that starts at 7:00 PM!

Finally, we finished our Lake Michigan season with the Chicago to Mackinac Race. The Chicago Yacht Club's Race to Mackinac is the world's oldest freshwater yacht race. We set sail Saturday, July 22. Three hundred boats crewed by 3,000 sailors compete annually in this 333-mile race from Chicago to Mackinac Island, Mich. Founded in 1898, this year marks the 102nd anniversary of the race's founding and the 93rd running of the race. This year was a little bit slow, with most of the race upwind (beating) or drifting in "no" air. Luckily, Gandydancer and crew had years of training in "no" air on Lake Carlyle! We finished 2nd in the Open division and beat all the other Corsair boats with an elapsed time of 60 hrs/59min/18seconds! The winner was a custom boat piloted by Mead Gougeon, inventor/owner of West System epoxies.

OUR BYC BOATS

This is a unique sailboat, as it has no standing rigging. The huge tapered mast is anchored on the keel with a compression ring and a stainless steel through bolt. In addition the mast is held in place by another compression ring on the cabin top.

The interior is light and airy with a Vee berth forward and an aft cabin for accommodating 4 in comfort. The head is to Starboard and is "L" shaped with a shower.

The Port side galley has a two-burner alcohol stove with oven and a refrigerator on the centerline of the boat. The refrigerator and the galley counters are topped with Corian. The "U" shaped dining area has hidden lighting above the table in the overhead for a warm soft ambiance.

The aft cockpit is equipped with a bimini and has a stern entry and swim ladder that lowers directly into the water.

Jim has installed many extra electrical features such as remote operation of the VHF radio from the helm.

May they both continue to enjoy their "MOONRAKER" for many years.

FLOTSAM AND JETSAM

MUD DAUBERS, anyone?

Or would you prefer mosquitoes, gnats, flies, and a thousand

spiders? I have experienced all of the above including a mouse! With the help of many of you, I have finally found an answer to this problem. There is an item available; the trouble is there is no consistent supply nor is it convenient to get. The answer? A pest strip similar to what we all knew at one time years ago as the Shell Pest Strip. Now it is available in such few stores and at such rare times as to make it almost impossible to get. I have a source and can get it in cases of 12. The yellow strip is encased in a rigid white plastic with a large plastic hanger and is effective against wasps, flies, mosquitoes, gnats, spiders, etc. for up to four months. It is to be hung in an area approximately 10' x 13' or smaller and that works in most all our boats.

To use, I hang one in my mid-cabin hatch and one inside my mainsail upon leaving the boat. When returning, I open the boat, hold my breath, place the hanging unit inside a plastic case and place inside a box under the helmseat, allowing a few minutes for the boat to air out. No mud daubers, no flies, no gnats, no mosquitoes, no spiders, no odor, no residue!! NO PROBLEMS!

Within the sail area, it has considerably reduced but not totally eliminated the mud daubers. What a blessing to open the sail and no longer experience 10 lbs. of mud and spiders spilling onto the just-cleaned deck.

The cost for each of these is \$5.50 and if you wish to own any, I will place an order for them. I will only place an order upon receiving sales of 12 which means it only takes 6 people buying two each, so they can have a bug-free environment on their boat.

Of course, if you have a bimini that gets folded or a dock box, that would be 3! Note—cutting one in half and placing inside each section of bimini also gives protection, and at the end of the season, you could cut in half and place in dock box for end of season over winter.
