Boulder Marina Invaded with (or by) Strange Growths

What are those nasty looking things we've seen in our Lake recently? They look awful! And they seem to be everywhere. They're stuck to the docks; they're floating in the water. They are even stuck to some boat bottoms. Rest assured, they are not harmful. Ugly, but not harmful. They are an invertebrate called a bryozoa or "moss animal." The massive, gelatinous bryozoa, Pectinatella magnifica, is the largest of the roughly 50 freshwater species and is probably the most common bryozoan in lakes and ponds in the southeast. At maturity, the colony is commonly the size of a grapefruit or a small watermelon, however they can measure as large as two feet or more in diameter. They are usually at-

tached to twigs, logs, rocks or even boat docks; however, they sometimes become unattached and can be found floating. They seem to prefer highly organic pond and lake bottoms, whereas sandy and pebbly bottoms are poor habitat. Bryozoans often go unseen because they are sensitive to direct sunlight and are often found several feet below the surface, depending on water clarity. So with our water clarity, they can be floating very close to the surface and still not get any sunlight. Each bryozoa colony consists of thousands of zooids. These zooids each have tiny protrusions with a mouth and tentacles, which create a current to filter the water for food particles. The rest of the body as well as the whole colony itself are encapsulated by a slimy, gelatinous covering called a zooecium. They can multiply several different ways, including the formation of highly resistant statoblasts (eggs) that enables them to over-winter and en-

dure almost any period of adverse conditions. Adult colonies, however, usually die in the fall when the water temperature drops below 16 degrees C. Although strange and nasty in appearance, these animals are absolutely harmless. In fact, bryozoans are thought to be useful indicators of water quality. Pectinatella magnifica, for example, is said to prefer eutrophic (highly fertile) ponds and lakes, whereas it would be less likely to occur in infertile or contaminated waters. So I guess that tells us we have a very fertile lake. I'm not so sure that's a good thing. But that's what we have.

So not to worry. You won't get eaten. And you won't get some awful disease from these critters. If you would like to

Spring 4 had all manner of winds from strong to none. Some of the most thrilling racing to date could be seen even to the most casual observer. After an early start foul, Desperado made up for the time penalty and then some by correcting first, followed by October Breeze who, once again sailed a tremendous race. Nice job to both skippers and their crews.

Spring 5 on June 15 hosted only 8 racers-down from the eleven and twelve racers in the previous races. This race became a knock-down, drag-out battle between Trouble Doll, Casa Cita, Desperado and MissBHaven with an incredible performance by the crew of Casa Cita who finally caught Desperado who led at the first mark, pulled out ahead and stayed that way, scratching and correcting first.
