COMMODORE'S CORNER

Insect Time

After the extremely mild winter this last year, the insect population will be high. Last summer was very bad with spiders and paper wasps, and of course the mud daubers.

You should think about "Bug Bombing" your boat at the first opportunity. The newer water-activated insect foggers are great. Because they are activated by a small amount of water in the bottom of the container, there is no chance of a fire on board your vessel. In addition, these foggers take several seconds to start working so they allow time to get out of the boat and close it up before they start fogging.

On a boat up to twenty-five feet in length, one fogger can should be enough. Over twenty-five feet use two cans. Place in a relatively open area such as the cabin sole. Do not place directly on a food preparation surface.

The best time to fog your boat is when you are leaving at the weekend.

The next week when you return, air your boat out well and then use "No Pest Strips" if you can find them, for continuous insect control.

Caution - Caution - Caution Eye-Witness Account

Saturday, May 13. Your Commodore, on board a vessel barreling southward down the lake towards the dam, witnesses near collision with a vessel which was in the BYC Spring Race #1.

Our skipper and his guests were in the center of the lake sailing with only the main up, when he suddenly realized we were in the middle of the race fleet with two boats heading for the finish that would clear our vessel. Then we all discovered there were two boats to our port side that were getting closer by the second. It then became apparent that we would have to go to port and attempt to get behind one of the vessels, but our boat speed and weight kept us from responding quickly enough.

The other vessel was able to avoid a collision by turning away at the last couple of seconds, avoiding what could have been a very nasty accident. By turning away, he lost second position in the race by a very slim margin to another racer and his crew.

All of us on board are relieved that no damage was done and no one was injured in the rapid maneuvering to avoid colliding. The other skipper, sportsman that he is, graciously accepted an apology from our skipper after the race.

This situation has been encountered by some of us in the past. It just points out how vigilant we all must be at all times, particularly when there is a race event, due to so many vessels going in several directions at the same time. So lets be watchful and careful out there.

FROM THE VICE COMMODORE

Observations: Halyard Music?

A soft and pleasant breeze blowing gently through the open hatch, causing your boat to sway ever so slightly as it caresses the rigging, wafting its way across the quiet marina. Through the open port, you are in awe of the beauty of a star-filled evening sky with the moon smiling brightly. Occasionally you hear the haunting and unmistakable sound of a distant train whistle, calling out into the night as it rushes to some distant city. Regrettably, to this we at Boulder Marina must also add the cacophony of slapping and clanging halyards.

An improperly secured halyard not only is an annoyance to all neighboring vessels; it also causes premature and unnecessary wear and tear on the running rigging of your vessel.

There is no need to scour the catalogs for expensive

solutions to this time old problem. Here are a few free methods of putting a silencer on those noisy halyards:

1. Loop a bungee cord or short line around a shroud and the halyard. The bungee should be a sufficient length to hold the halyard away from the mast.

2. Flip the halyard around the end of your spreader before securing to the base of the mast.

3. Attach your main halyard shackle to a sail tie on your boom away from the mast.

4. Attach your main halyard shackle to a lifeline.

There are as many ways to silence a noisy halyard, as there are stories of groundings on the great Carlyle Lake. Use your imagination and resourcefulness to make our marina a more pleasant environment. Your neighbors will definitely appreciate your thoughtfulness.
